FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents,

This Sunday we remember and give thanks for our fathers and those very important father figures in our lives.

Dads who engage with their children become their children's heroes. They are central to every life experience those children will have, and will deeply affect how they react, behave, learn, develop a sense of self, and interact with others. A dad is paramount to a child's sense of security and stability. As the saying goes, "A father is a son's first hero and a daughter's first love." As a dad, we don't often stop to think about the profound influence we have on our children's lives. Yet they are always watching, imitating and learning.



Through play and spending time with our children, we teach them strategies for life, including selfcontrol, care and consideration, kindness, fairness, morals, fun, humour and risk taking. These principles are all subtly imparted during roughhousing, for example, when a dad pretends to wrestle his kids. Kids love it! Dad is the greatest! But more than this, they are learning how to develop attitudes towards winning, losing, discovering strengths and dealing with weakness. They are learning aspects of the psychology of coping.

We have all learned so many life-lessons from our dads. So, this Sunday gives us time to stop and honour our first hero or first love, whether they are with us or have passed on.

Sir Ken Robinson

Sir Ken Robinson, a visionary who has inspired teachers and leaders around the world to challenge the status quo and bring about meaningful change in education, passed away on Friday 21 August after a short battle with cancer.

In addition to being one of the world's elite thinkers on creativity, Robinson was a celebrated author, speaker and international advisor on education in the arts to government, non-profits, education and arts bodies.

In 2003, Robinson received a Knighthood from Queen Elizabeth II for his services to the Arts and, just a few years later, shook up the education world with his inspiring TED talk, 'Do schools kill creativity?', which has since been viewed more than 66 million times and seen by an estimated 350 million people in 160 countries.

The talk called for a radical rethink of schooling and reasons that it is incumbent upon educators to prepare children for the unpredictability of future events by putting a stronger focus on creativity and learning through failure rather than being afraid of it.

"If you are not prepared to be wrong, you will never come up with something original. By the time children get to be adults, they have lost that capacity...they have become frightened of being wrong," Robinson reasons in the TED talk.

"We run our companies like this, by the way – we stigmatise mistakes, and we're now running national education systems where mistakes are the worst thing you can make.

The result, said Robinson, is that we are educating people out of their creative capacities.

"Picasso once said that all children are born artists. The problem is to remain an artist as we grow up," he said.

"I believe passionately that we don't grow into creativity – we grow out of it, or rather, we are educated out of it".

Reaching Out

St Mary of the Cross MacKillop, Australia's patron saint, has often been viewed as a "nuts and bolts saint" – because she was devoted to giving people the basic tools to overcome poverty, illiteracy and social isolation.

Despite hardship and persecution including excommunication from the Catholic Church, Mary made an extraordinary impact during her 67 years, establishing more than 40 schools for the poor as well as orphanages and homes for the destitute, with the order she cofounded, the Sisters of St Joseph.

She was well remembered for telling the sisters in her order, "Never see a need without doing something about it."

In the current time of the pandemic with which we are faced, what needs can we see in our homes, our neighbourhood, our friends, and in our community? During this time, what can we do about these needs? How can we connect? How do we show kindness? How can we give people the benefit of the doubt? How do we manage the prejudices we have formed?

Sometimes it is as simple as reaching out and connecting with someone via Zoom or Facetime, or intentionally asking how someone is going, and listening with a desire to understand and support.

This is how simple acts of kindness and hope manifest themselves in times of challenge and darkness. As individuals we do not have the capacity to stop the crisis with which we are confronted. However, it is in our power to help make it better for the people in our lives.

Stage 4 restrictions are due to end in a little more than a week, which is one week prior to the end of the current term. Reports in the media suggest that there will be a gradual easing of Stage 4 Restrictions and, therefore, it appears very unlikely that there will be a return of any students prior to the school holidays.

As a school community we are hopeful of a return to onsite classes for students from the beginning of next term. We await to hear from the Victorian government and health authorities regarding the planned return of students. Previous media releases have indicated that the Minister for Education will make an announcement during the last week of this term.

In the meantime, know that we are a strong community at OHR, and that we are here for you.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to his disciples: 'If your brother does something wrong, go and have it out with him alone, between your two selves. If he listens to you, you have won back your brother. If he does not listen, take one or two others with you: the evidence of two or three witnesses is required to sustain any charge. But if he refuses to listen to these, report it to the community; and if he refuses to listen to the community, treat him like a pagan or a tax collector.
