FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Parishioners,

During Term 4 in 2019 Our Holy Redeemer began to work with the City of **Boroondara** on the *Active and Safe Schools* program (BASS). OHR was selected as one of only two schools to be involved in the program that helps to create a safer travel environment for students and families walking and riding to school.

Our aim at the time was to work with Council through road safety education, with the aim of increasing the number of students walking and cycling to school and identifying potential traffic infrastructure improvements.

Our school was visited a number of times by Council 12 months ago to provide an opportunity for everyone to take part in helping our school to be a safer, healthier and pleasant environment for everyone.

These opportunities included:

- Pop-Up Stall to provide a chance to share any concerns and ideas on road safety
- Whole-of-school Travel Surveys for students and parents

These opportunities were led by Tara Watson, the BASS Project Officer.

In Term 1 of this year, Tara met frequently with a representative body of students comprising our

school captains and vice-captains – Bridget N, Meg M, Jessica C, Ryco P and Emma M.

During Monday's Virtual Assembly, the school captains and vicecaptains spoke about the meetings that were held and the work undertaken during this period of time. The script is reproduced below and, hopefully, provides some context as to why your child is bringing home some maps today including, "Tracks to School: Suggested routes to Our Holy Redeemer".

<u>Mr Dame</u>: Last year and during Term 1 our School Captains and Vice Captains worked with Tara Watson from the Boroondara Council on the **BASS** road safety program. This morning I have invited our Captains to discuss some of the things that have occurred.



<u>Jessica</u>: **BASS** stands for Boroondara Active and Safe Schools program. During Term 1 we met and worked with Tara quite a few times. Tara would always ride her bike to school and meet with us in the Conference Room, which is just near Mr Dame's office.

<u>*Ryco*</u>: The reason we came together on all of those occasions was to come up with ways to encourage more children to walk or ride to school, even if it was only for part of the way.

<u>Meg</u>: During our planning meetings we discussed the benefits of walking or riding to school. We also looked at some of the things that might stop us from doing this. Perhaps your teacher can pause the video now so your class can discuss the benefits of walking or riding.

<u>Bridget</u>: As a group we came up with a number of ideas to encourage children to either walk or ride. You don't have to do this everyday, but even doing some exercise once or twice a week is better than none at all.

<u>Emma</u>: We had to stop working with Tara towards the end of Term 1 when all schools went to remote learning,

but not before we suggested that it would be helpful to have some maps which could show some safe walking and riding routes to school.

Jessica: Today you will receive some maps like these ones. They include:

- Tracks to School: Suggested routes to OHR, and
- Tracks to School Route Map

<u>*Ryco*</u>: We will be doing further work in this area and share it with you this term.

Meg, Bridget & Emma:

Always take care when riding or walking:

- When crossing the road STOP. LOOK. LISTEN. THINK!
- Take care near driveways Look and listen
- Phones down, heads up
- Use traffic lights and pedestrian crossings wherever possible

<u>Mr Dame</u>: When walking or riding to school it is always important to remember the above road safety rules at all times. We also have to remember that sometimes it is the motorists who are not always concentrating.

Footnote: I recently lobbied Council in a bid to reinstate a crossing supervisor at the intersection of Mont Albert and Union Roads. Forty percent of crossing supervisors are over 70 years of age and as a result of COVID-19, the supervisors in this age bracket are not currently available. Council has engaged a private company to provide supervisors, but apparently are encountering difficulty recruiting interested persons. Yesterday, we received the positive news that a new crossing supervisor has been allocated to the Mont Albert and Union Roads intersection. If you cross at this intersection in the mornings or afternoons, make sure you say 'Hello' to Frank (not to be confused with me).

CBCA Book Week

Established in 1946, the Children's Book Council of Australia (CBCA) Book of the Year Awards are the longest running and one of the most highly respected literature prizes in Australia. Pip Harry's *The Little Wave* took out book of the year for younger readers. Written in verse, the book's central character Jack has never been to the beach and is desperate to get there. Harry says *The Little Wave* is a "quiet verse novel, with gentle themes, about overcoming adversity".

Formation of Classes

The teaching staff are commencing the process of developing class placements for the 2021 school year. The construction of class lists is a process that requires teaching staff to give consideration to a great variety of factors in an effort to create a social, emotional, behavioural and academic balance within any given class, as detailed in the *Rationale* of our Formation of Classes Policy:

"At OHR we believe that learning is influenced by a diverse range of factors. The professional knowledge, judgement and discretion of all teachers is critical to the placement of students. The class allocation process should follow protocols which address the balance of social, emotional and academic needs of each child."

A copy of the Formation of Classes Policy is attached to today's newsletter for your reference. Please take the time to read through the policy carefully, as it clearly articulates a range of considerations that need to be factored when placing every individual child into a class. The policy informs the decisions of staff as we collaboratively construct class lists over the coming weeks.

School Closure Days

- As previously advised, the Premier of Victoria has announced that the Friday public holiday before the AFL Grand Final will be moved from its original date (Friday 25 September) to tomorrow, Friday 23 October 2020. The Friday public holiday before the AFL Grand Final is based on the AFL playing schedule, which was altered as a result of COVID-19.

- Note: There will be no school closure days for staff professional learning this term.

RE Learning in 3/4TK





A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees they got together and, to disconcert him, one of them put a question, 'Master, which is the greatest commandment of the law?' Jesus said, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second resembles it: you must love your neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments hang the whole Law, and the Prophets also.'

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Formation of Classes

RATIONALE:

At Our Holy Redeemer we believe that learning is influenced by a diverse range of factors. The professional knowledge, judgement and discretion of all teachers is critical to the placement of students. The class allocation process should follow protocols which address the balance of social, emotional and academic needs of each child.

AIMS:

At Holy Redeemer we will:

- Allocate students to their next learning environment with consideration given to individual needs;
- Allocate students to their next learning environment with consideration given to a balance of gender, social and academic groupings;
- Allocate students according to information gained from professional dialogue with colleagues, consultation with the principal, and other relevant data;
- Be collaborative as a staff;
- Maintain confidentiality throughout the entire process; and
- Ensure a rigorous process of information handover with fellow colleagues once the class placements have been finalised.

IMPLEMENTATION:

- All attempts will be made for students to be placed with at least one friend. However, teaching staff will decide whether friendship groupings are suitable to the learning needs of the class.
- Consideration will be given to the dynamics of particular groups of students or individuals.
- Consideration will be given to a balance of:
 - students with disabilities;
 - academic ability;
 - □ social, emotional and behavioural factors;
 - □ gender;
 - □ place in family;
 - □ siblings and cousins; and
 - □ leadership qualities.
- Student's names are placed on cards that are coded according to a variety of criteria.
- Levels will develop a draft of class placement structures during level meetings that follow the class placement criteria, and bring to staff meeting for further refinement.

- The Principal will then ratify all class placements.
- To assist the transition process, parents of children with special needs will be notified of their child's class placement through a Program Support Group (PSG) meeting.
- Final placement will be communicated during the final full week of the school year.

EVALUATION:

- This policy will be reviewed every three years.
- Last reviewed: October 2020
