FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Parishioners,

Some years ago, I shared the following story. A good story can be told more than once.

A couple of years ago a family moved into a house on a somewhat busy road. Much to the irritation of their neighbours they kept their Christmas lights burning long after the season was gone. The lights were on through January and February and drew critical remarks from those who passed by: "What a lazy bunch live there; think they'd have the lights down by now."

Towards the middle of March, a large sign appeared outside the house; the sign simply said, "Welcome home, Michael". Word eventually got around that the family had a son in Afghanistan and they had unashamedly left the lights on in anticipation of his return. Lights are a symbol of hope.

Each of us has had an experience when the power has failed and we are left in darkness. What was familiar and assuring to us is no longer visible and trickles of apprehension course through our body. What a relief when a match is struck and our familiar surroundings come back to comfort us. It could be that as parents we experience a child of ours getting "off track" in life. It might appear on the surface that that they are being in defiance of us, whereas, they might be struggling with self-confidence and a lack of ability to cope with life as we wish it to be.

The following verses titled, "The Light upon the Sea", use the sea as an image of life:

There was a time it seemed as though My life was tossing to and fro And I, left with nowhere to go, Was subject to the sea.

But there, ahead, a beam of light Peered through the darkness of the night And granted me clearer light That I might be set free.

I steered a course towards the land To find a refuge on the sand And maybe touch the gentle hand That guided me along.

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Sunday Gospel


The liturgy of the Catholic Church provides a framework for reflection which is used by Catholics

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone by themselves. There in their presence he was transfigured: his clothes became dazzlingly white, whiter than any earthly bleacher could make them. Elijah appeared to them with Moses; and they were talking with Jesus. Then Peter spoke to Jesus. 'Rabbi,' he said 'it is wonderful for us to be here; so let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses and one



for Elijah.' He did not know what to say; they were so frightened. And a cloud came, covering them in shadow; and there came a voice from the cloud, 'This is my Son, the Beloved. Listen to him.' Then suddenly, when they looked round, they saw no one with them any more but only Jesus.

As they came down from the mountain he warned them to tell no one what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. They observed the warning faithfully, though among themselves they discussed what 'rising from the dead' could mean.

RE LEARNING IN PREP HH

In Prep, we are learning about Our Prayer Place. We discussed where we pray, who we pray to and reasons why we might pray. We have also been exploring the items and symbols of the different objects that we find in Our Prayer Place.

Each morning the students take turns to lead prayer with the Sign of the Cross and then organise our Prayer Table once prayer is finished for the morning.



Collection Notice for parents/guardians 2021 Student Residential Address and Other Information

The Australian Government Department of Education, Skills and Employment (the department) would like to advise you that a request has been made for your child's school to provide residential address and other information as required under the Australian Education Regulation 2013 (Cth).

The school is required to provide the department with the following information about each student at the school:

- Names and residential addresses of students' parent(s) and/or guardian(s)
- Student residential address (excluding student names)
- Whether the student is a primary or secondary student (education level)
- Whether the student is boarding or a day student (boarding status).

Your child's school generates a unique and unidentifiable record number for each student record. The number is only used by the school for this collection. It is not allowed to be used for any other purpose. The number indicates to the department that each record provided is for one student.

Purpose of the collection

The Student Residential Address and Other Information Collection (the Collection) informs Australian Government school education policy and helps ensure funding for non-government schools is based on need.

The information collected will be used to inform school funding calculations. It is combined with data held by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) to calculate a non-government school community's anticipated capacity to contribute to the costs of schooling.

From 2020, a new measure of capacity to contribute, the Direct Measure of Income (DMI), was introduced. The DMI is based on the median income of parents or guardians of students at a non-government school using data collected through the Collection. More information about the DMI can be found at https://www.education.gov.au/what-direct-measure-income.

Use and disclosure of personal information

Your personal information is protected by law under the *Privacy Act 1988* (Cth) (Privacy Act). Personal information is information or an opinion about an identifiable individual. Personal information includes an individual's name and contact details.

Any use or disclosure of your personal information must occur in accordance with Privacy Act and the Australian Education Act 2013 and Australian Education Regulation 2013.

Your personal information provided to the department through the Collection may be:

- disclosed to the ABS for the purposes of capacity to contribute calculations and analysis as a part of the Multi-Agency Data Integration Project (MADIP). Further information about MADIP can be found on the <u>MADIP page</u> on the ABS website.
- disclosed to a contracted auditor where the department may from time to time, carry out an audit of
 a school's submission to the Collection. The contracted auditor compares the school's submission with
 the student enrolment information held by the school and will not use the information for any other
 purpose
- disclosed to its service providers for the purposes of the provision of information and communications technology support services to the department
- used or disclosed where it is otherwise required or authorised by law.

The department does not intend to disclose your personal information to any overseas recipients.

The department's privacy policy can be found at www.dese.gov.au and includes information on:

- how individuals can access and seek correction of the personal information held by the department;
- how complaints about potential breaches or breaches of the Privacy Act can be made;
- how the department will deal with these complaints.

The department commissioned an independent privacy impact assessment (PIA). The PIA assesses the flows of information under the Collection, compliance with the Privacy Act and measures in place to safeguard the personal information being collected. The report is being updated, and will be available in 2021 on the SchoolsHUB Address Collection help and support page. The current version is available at https://docs.education.gov.au/node/31436.

What do you need to do?

You are not required to do anything. Your school is responsible for providing the requested details to the department; however, you may wish to ensure that your school has the most up-to-date and correct details for your family.
