FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Parishioners,

Silence for one or two minutes is included in the Anzac Day ceremony as a sign of respect and a time for reflection.

The idea for the two-minutes silence is said to have originated with Edward George Honey, a Melbourne journalist and First World War veteran who was living in London in 1919. He wrote a letter to the London Evening News in which he appealed for fiveminutes' silence, to honour the sacrifice of those who had died during the war.

In October 1919 Sir Percy Fitzpatrick, a South African, suggested a period of silence on Armistice Day in all the countries of the empire. Throughout the war, whenever South African troops suffered heavy losses on the Western Front, a period of silence had been observed at noon in Cape Town. Fitzpatrick's suggestion was presented to King George V, who readily agreed to the proposal. But after a trial with the Grenadier guards at Buckingham Palace, at which both Honey and Fitzpatrick were present, the period of silence was shortened to two minutes. It is unclear whether Honey and Fitzpatrick ever met or discussed ideas about the silence.



On 6 November 1919 the King sent a special message to the people of the Commonwealth:

I believe that my people in every part of the Empire fervently wish to perpetuate the memory of that Great Deliverance, and of those who laid down their lives to achieve it.

The King requested that "a complete suspension of all our normal activities" be observed for two minutes at "the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" so that "in perfect stillness the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the Glorious Dead".

Two minutes' silence was first observed in Australia on the first anniversary of the Armistice and continues to be observed on Remembrance Day, 11 November. Over the years, a one-minute silence has also been incorporated into ANZAC Day and other commemorative ceremonies.

Years 5 and 6 Camp

There are only five more sleeps until the students in Years 5 and 6 commence their four-day camp to Coonawarra Farm Resort. Despite what some parents may think, the Camp is not located in the Coonawarra wine-growing district! In fact, we will be travelling in exactly the opposite direction. The outdoor activity-based Camp is a just over a three hour drive from Melbourne in East Gippsland. The program offers a range of exciting experiences and challenges for the students.

The campers depart on Tuesday morning and will return to school on Friday afternoon.

OHR Cross Country

Today, all students in Years 3 - 6 will participate in the OHR School Cross Country at Macleay Park in North Balwyn. The Cross Country is run as a House event and is conducted in the lead-up to the North Balwyn District Cross Country. The students in Years 3 and 4 will run approximately 1500 metres while those in Years 5 and 6 will cover a distance of approximately 2000 metres.



Science Talent Search (STS)

During the last week of Term One, our Science teacher, Mrs Stephanie Axon emailed all parents with details of this year's STS, which is open to students in years 2-6. Newsletter No 10 contained a further reminder from Mrs Axon. Proposals are due tomorrow, Friday 23 April.

Additional Funding for Tutors

Last year the State Government announced that money would be distributed across schools to provide additional assistance to students following the impact on learning as a result of COVID-19. In fact, the money allocated equated to \$20 per student. In schools, with a total student population less than 250, the grant was increased to a school total of \$5,000. Over the course of a year this equates to approximately 1 hour 15 minutes per week of additional student support. At OHR we will double the time to 2 hours 30 minutes per week and concentrate the program across Terms 2 and 3.

OHR have made the decision to target Mathematics support in the areas of Number and Place Value.

Based on the results of standardised testing and 1:1 interviews in Mathematics, students from year levels 1 - 6 have been selected to participate in the program.

Commencing this term, Mrs Esther Jackson will work with small groups of students, supporting them with number and place value skill development. Student sessions will run between 30-35 minutes on Mondays.

Winter Uniform



In the final newsletter of Term 1 I wrote that as the first few weeks of Term 2 can offer temperamental weather with a mixture of warmer and cooler days, the children are allowed to wear either summer or winter uniform for the first fortnight. Therefore, all children are expected to be in winter uniform from Monday 3 May.

Chess Tournament at OHR

Mrs Leone Gole has proudly organised for OHR to host an interschool chess tournament on **Tuesday 4 May**. The tournament will take place in the hall, and last for most of the day. Each participant will play a total of seven games. We wish all our participants representing OHR well for the day.



Answering Those Deeper Questions About OHR #6

This week we provide two further questions and answers that may assist you, as parents, in answering some of those more challenging questions posed by prospective parents. Each week, we will continue to provide one or two of those questions that will be addressed through the Newsletter.

I've heard OHR has composite classes – do you think this is a good or bad thing? At OHR, whether as part of a composite class or as part of a single year level class, we cater for a broad range of abilities. We recognise that even within any single level there is always a great cross section of abilities. The teaching program is structured in a way to cater for the individual differences of our students. In this sense, we support children that require extension, but also focus on children that require support.

How do I know if my child is ready for school next year? Is there anyone I should consult? Any thoughts on my child attending school when they're turning 5 or just turned 5 (not 6) in the year of entry?

Every child is different, and the age of the child is not the only determinant for school readiness. At OHR we aim to help all children in their learning, whether they require extension or support.

We suggest that parents talk to the child's pre-school teacher to understand whether their child is ready for school.

Next School Closure Day

During Term 2 there will be one school closure day for staff professional development. This will take place on Wednesday 12 May.

Sunday Gospel



A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus said:

'I am the good shepherd: the good shepherd is one who lays down his life for his sheep. The hired man, since he is not the shepherd and the sheep do not belong to him, abandons the sheep and runs away as soon as he sees a wolf coming, and then the wolf attacks and scatters the sheep; this is because he is only a hired man and has no concern for the sheep. I am the good shepherd; I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father; and I lay down my life for my sheep. And there are other sheep I have that are not of this fold, and these I have to lead as well. They too will listen to my voice, and there will be only one flock and one shepherd. The Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me; I lay it down of my own free will, and as it is in my power to lay it down, so it is in my power to take it up again; and this is the command I have been given by my Father.'
