Dear Parents and Parishioners,

#### **NAPLAN Online**

In May each year, students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN). NAPLAN is moving online. This means moving NAPLAN from the paper-based tests to computer-based assessments. The transition to NAPLAN Online commenced at Our Holy Redeemer in 2018, with OHR being amongst the first 500 schools across the nation to participate in the online assessment format.

From 11 May our students in Years 3 and 5 will sit the tests again using the online format. Only

the Year 3 Writing Test will still be administered nationally as a paper-based test. Towards the end of last term our students sat a practice test session to familiarise themselves with the online platform.

NAPLAN Online uses a tailored test or adaptive design, where the test automatically adapts to a student's performance and asks questions that match the student's achievement level, allowing the student to demonstrate their knowledge. This provides teachers and schools with more targeted and detailed information on students' performance on the tests.

At OHR we have scheduled the tests to be administered on Tuesday 11 May, Thursday 13 May, Tuesday 18 May and Wednesday 19 May.

#### First Eucharist

As previously notified, our Parishes will celebrate First Eucharist on **Sunday 30th May and Sunday 6 June**. Due to the ongoing restrictions on numbers in our Churches and the need to maintain a parish Sunday Mass schedule, the parish have had to make a change to the time we will celebrate the First Eucharist Mass. Rather than the previously advertised time of 2:00 pm the Masses will now take place at **1:00 pm**.

Therefore, at OHR the masses will be held on the following dates and times:

- Sunday 30 May, 1:00 pm Eucharist I (Students currently in Year 5 OHR)
- Sunday 6 June, 1:00 pm Eucharist II (Students currently in Year 4 OHR).

#### **Enrolments for 2022**

A good number of families turned up to last Thursday's Open Morning. Thank you to Genevieve Little, Lisa Cuteri, Roshi Weeratunge, Kelly Wong and Belinda Grant who provided a positive parent perspective during the morning tea.

Enrolments for next year have officially opened. If you have a child who will be commencing school next year, or have a friend who is intending to enrol their child, please ensure enrolment forms are lodged with the Office by, **Friday** 

**14 May**. We need this information in order to ascertain student numbers for 2022. Enrolment figures are used to determine class numbers and structures. Our enrolment figures impact directly on the funding OHR receives.

Family Enrolment Meetings will be held towards the end of May. The enrolment meetings serve as an invaluable opportunity to meet with every child enrolled for next year.

#### **Chess Tournament at OHR**

Mrs Leone Gole has proudly organised for OHR to host an interschool chess tournament this **Tuesday 4 May**. The Tournament will take place in the Hall, and run for most of the day. Each participant will play a total of seven games. We wish all our participants representing OHR well for the day.

#### **Next School Closure Day**

During Term 2 there will be one school closure day for staff professional development. This will take place on Wednesday 12 May.

## **RE LEARNING IN 3/4PK**

This term's gospel value, being persistence, allows us to focus on how much effort we place on our learning, both academically and socially.

#### Linking to the Gospel

The Parable of the Widow and the Judge (Luke 18: 1-8)

In this parable, Jesus teaches us about prayer and to not lose heart.

The widow persists in her request for her rights. She eventually wears the judge down and he grants her request. Jesus would like us to be equally persistent with our prayers and make prayer central in our lives.

When we make prayer central we are able to focus on all aspects of our lives. Our persistence in achieving our best in our learning will open many doors for us in the future.

#### Linking to Life Experiences

Placing the word persistence in context in our everyday lives, 3/4PK watched a short animation clip titled '*Caminandes Llamigos*'. This short animation focuses on Koro the Llama fighting with Oti, a penguin, over the last tasty berry. Koro's persistence did not initially achieve the desired outcome, but with patience (and prayers) the hard work eventually paid off.

For the students in 3/4PK the term PERSISTENCE means:

- Continuing to repeat actions that will help us achieve successfully in our everyday learning.
- Having a go at all the hard things and achieving something positive at the end.





- If you don't succeed, try and try again.
- Not aiving up. •
- Determined to finish tasks.
- We do not see results instantly. We have to wait and be patient.
- Practising over and over again.

#### A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus said to his disciples:

'I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinedresser. Every branch in me that bears no fruit he cuts away, and every branch that does bear fruit he prunes to make it bear even more. You are pruned already, by means of the word that I have spoken to you. Make your home in me, as I make mine in you. As a branch cannot bear fruit all by itself, but must remain part of the vine, neither can you unless you remain in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me, with me in him, bears fruit in plenty; for cut off from me vou can do nothing. Anvone who does not remain in me is like a branch that has been thrown away – he withers; these branches are collected and thrown on the fire, and they are burnt. If you remain in me and my words remain in you, you may ask what you will and you shall get it. It is to the glory of my Father that you should bear much fruit, and then you will be my disciples.'
