

Dear Parents and Parishioners,

NAIDOC Week concluded on Sunday. What a memorable way to conclude such a significant week with Ash Barty's incredible triumph in winning the women's singles final at Wimbledon. Barty played the match of her life to become the first Aussie woman since Goolagong-Cawley in 1980 to take the crown.

So, what is NAIDOC Week all about? NAIDOC stands for National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee. Its origins



This year's theme – **Heal Country!** – calls for stronger measures to recognise, protect and maintain all aspects of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture and heritage.

The 2021 National NAIDOC Poster, 'Care for Country' was designed by Gubbi Gubbi artist Maggie-Jean Douglas.

Using the 2021 NAIDOC Week theme, Heal Country!, as inspiration; 'Care for Country' is a bright and vibrant artwork which explores how Country has cared for and healed First Nations people spiritually, physically, emotionally, socially and culturally.

The artwork includes communities, people, animals and bush medicines spread over different landscapes of red dirt, green grass, bush land and coastal areas to tell the story of the many ways Country can and has healed us throughout our lives and journeys.

The old furniture will be collected by Pacific Assist in the coming months. Pacific Assist is an Australian-based not-for-profit charity serving the nations of the South Pacific. Our furniture will eventually make its way to an island nation that desperately requires classroom furniture.

In addition, all student artwork will be featured on a special page of the City of Boroondara website in the coming weeks.

Every Day Counts

The Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools (MACS) updated Attendance Policy articulates the following under its Purpose:

In accordance with the <u>Education Training and Reform Act 2006 (Vic.)</u> (the Act) and the <u>Education and Training Reform Regulations 2017 (Vic.)</u>, school attendance is compulsory for children and young people aged from 6 to 17 years unless an exemption from attendance has been granted.

Whilst ensuring student attendance at school is a legal obligation of parents/guardians, supporting students to attend school each day is the shared responsibility of all parents, students, the school and the wider community.

School attendance is important as it maximises life opportunities for children and young people by providing them with education and support networks. Positive engagement with schooling enhances academic and wellbeing outcomes for children and young people (eXcel: Wellbeing for learning in Catholic school communities). Attending school every school day for the whole day enables students to participate in the school's educational program as well as develop their social skills. Regular attendance enables the school to:

- plan an organised educational program that is delivered in a consistent way and has continuity
- facilitate shared student learning experiences that support the educational program
- monitor student progress and adjust the educational program to meet student needs. All schools must maintain attendance records, identify and follow up unexplained absences and develop procedures to support and maintain student attendance.

School Advisory Council: Repeated

As you know our school, like all the Catholic parish and diocesan schools in the Melbourne Archdiocese, is now under the guidance of Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools Ltd (MACS). Every school has been asked to establish a School Advisory Council as a way of giving parents and guardians a chance to be involved in the school.

Our current Parish School Education Board will continue as a School Advisory Council under a new Terms of Reference. At our most recent meeting, the Parish School Education Board, spent time tailoring the Terms of Reference to reflect the culture and mission of OHR.

The purpose of the School Advisory Council is to advise the Principal on important matters and be a support to the Principal and Leadership of the school in their decision-making process.

In many ways we have emphasised the importance of parents and guardians being involved in partnering with the school and the way this helps your children in their education.


Sunday Gospel
