FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Parishioners,

At the beginning of Term Three, I imagine many of us would have contemplated the term ahead being punctuated by a series of short sharp lockdowns to which we were becoming increasingly accustomed. None of us, however, would have anticipated the extended lockdown in which we have been immersed for nearly six weeks. This longer and protracted lockdown has taken a toll on many of us, perhaps none more so than our children who have missed the social interaction with their peers. The re-opening of playgrounds has gone some way to help our children stretch their legs and re-connect with others.

Navigating the reality of remote and flexible learning, prolonged family time and uncertainty about what the immediate future holds in store has made this a testing time for many.

I sincerely hope that the hard work of our teachers and learning support officers has resulted in the delivery of programs that have continued to support your children's learning. We can see that everyone is beginning to fatigue as the term draws to a close – students, parents and teachers – and welcome the respite from learning online.

I would like to take the opportunity to thank all parents and staff for the commitment shown while supporting our children with the Learning from Home Program. And most of all, let's acknowledge the growth of our children during this time of adversity. On behalf of everyone, I pray for sunnier days ahead during Term Four.

Charity

As COVID-19 continues to impact our Australian and global landscape, it has been heartening to see acts of love and generosity all around us. From strangers buying each other groceries, to restaurant staff handing out hot meals and care packages for those impacted by lockdowns, the outpouring of love and compassion sparked by this shared challenge has been remarkable. However, more people than ever before are also in need of the support and charity of others as they face turbulent times.

In any crisis, it is usually the poor and vulnerable who pay the biggest toll and become more reliant on the help of others. Charity and love are at the heart of what it means to be Christian. How might this challenge us to think, feel and act differently?

When Jesus was asked which commandment in the law was the greatest, his response was "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind". This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: "Love your neighbour as yourself" (Mt 22: 37–39). Love for God and love for neighbour quite simply 'go together'. Pope Benedict XVI, in his first encyclical, highlighted that for Christians, there is no love of God without the love of neighbour:

The unbreakable bond between love of God and love of neighbour is emphasised. One is so closely connected to the other that to say that we love God becomes a lie if we are closed to our neighbour or hate him altogether (2005, n. 16).

Jesus, in his actions and teachings, paints a very clear picture of what love of God and love of neighbour means – to feed the hungry, offer hospitality to the stranger, clothe the naked, look after the sick and visit those imprisoned (Mt 25: 35–45). Of all his parables and teachings, the story of the Good Samaritan (Lk 10: 25–37) succinctly and beautifully exemplifies the call to universal charity.



Established to mobilise people into action for those in most need across the globe, it is fitting that the United Nations International Day of Charity – held on 5 September – is celebrated on the anniversary of the death of Mother Teresa of Kolkata, the 'Saint of the Gutters' (Rosenberg 2019), who was a champion for the poor, sick, abandoned and dying. Her life gave witness to the love of God embodied in the teachings and actions of Jesus.

Mother Teresa is a profound example of how the love of Christ for all people urges us to respond to the needs of humanity and to accompany the poor. Charities and not-for-profit organisations are grounded in the principle of people and communities coming together to cooperate and build a better society.

Sadly, many Australian charities have been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. At a time when their services are being relied upon more than ever, they are overwhelmed by requests for help, scarcity of donations and difficulty attracting volunteers.

May the International Day of Charity serve to remind us to look at others through the eyes of Jesus himself and to see the face of Jesus in the poor.

The Power of Collective Efficacy at OHR

Last Friday, members of our School Leadership Team participated in a Zoom meeting where we were joined by <u>Dr Lyn Sharratt</u> from the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education. Also present were the leaders from St John's Heidelberg and staff from the Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools (MACS) Eastern Region Team.

Our Holy Redeemer and leaders from other Catholic primary and secondary schools have been working with, and supported by, Lyn Sharratt for more than three years. Over that period of time, we have worked with a deliberate focus to improve student growth in Writing and Mathematics. We have explored and trialled ways of effectively improving our teachers' instructional practices and approaches to assessment. Our students are more aware of self-assessment strategies and the tools they require to support their continued improvement.

All of this powerful work sits within the framework of The Learning Collaborative (TLC). The success of the TLC is underpinned by collective efficacy. We know that a team of individuals is more effective when they share the belief that through their unified efforts they can overcome challenges and produce intended results. In schools, when educators believe in their combined ability to influence student outcomes, there are significantly higher levels of academic achievement (Bandura, 1993). Bandura named this interesting pattern in human behaviour "collective efficacy," which he defined as "a group's shared belief in its conjoint capability to organise and execute the courses of action required to produce given levels of attainment" (Bandura, 1997, p. 477).


At OHR we endeavour to take collective responsibility for each student's progress where each student is a more active participant in their learning through an awareness of learning aims and the strategies they can adopt to achieve those aims.

We collaborate as a staff by moderating, reflecting and responding to students' needs in all areas of curriculum and pedagogical planning. This has fostered efficacy and supported each teacher to reflect on practice as well as develop a collective responsibility to sustain best practices in pedagogy. We are developing students to be more responsible and self-aware learners who know what they need to do to progress.

NAPLAN

In last week's Newsletter I made mention of the fact that our Year 3 & 5 students at Our Holy Redeemer sat NAPLAN Online is May this year. The School Summary Reports reflected that the median score of our students across every domain – Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar & Punctuation and Numeracy – sat above that of State.

When referring to the summary reports, note that the National scores have not yet been included in the NAPLAN Data Service's system.



- 4. Jesus said if you want to be great you must serve others. How can we serve others?


Jesus loved children. We pray that we can return that love by putting the needs of others before our own.




Maths Talent Quest 2021


1/2DE - What a Load of Rubbish!









1/2MJ - What's For Lunch?














3/4CB - Interruptions Galore








3/4PK - The Time Of My Life



Union Road Level Crossing Removal - Have your say on the design of new open space

Boroondara Council is running a community consultation to gather ideas on a new area of open space proposed by the Level Crossing Removal Project adjacent to Union Road. The LXRP will build the open space area with seating, trees etc, however Boroondara wants to make sure that the community's ideas are included in the design.

The feedback will be provided to the LXRP to ensure that the community's preferences are heard and met.

The consultation includes an online survey and three workshops beginning Saturday 11 September. Background information, concept designs and links to the survey and workshop bookings can be found at Engage Boroondara.
