FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Parishioners,

What the world currently needs are people to be kind. Sam Neil, actor, winemaker, "duck dad" and occasional ukulele player, has been keeping spirits high in times of COVID-19 isolation.

Since last year, when Neil should have been in London filming the latest instalment of the Jurassic World movies, he found himself "stuck at home like everybody else". He began passing the COVID-19 isolation days at his Sydney home by entertaining his 391,000 *Twitter* followers with his whimsical posts. He played Radiohead and Randy Newman songs on the ukulele, reads poems and children's books, displayed his dubious paintings, and made short films with his actor friends.

At the time Neil said, "I'm hopeless on the ukulele. I can't paint for nuts. I certainly can't write poetry, but I'm giving them all a go."

Starting when he was on downtime on film sets, Neill has long been a gentle, amusing presence on social media; the animals at the vineyard have become stars in their own right, something that has surprised his son Tim, coming from such a "private and reserved person".

Nowadays he is doing it to reassure people during these uncertain times of COVID-19.

"I just do all sorts of silly stuff that entertains me," Neill said at the time. "And if someone else who is also isolated and fearful and anxious gets some kind of enjoyment out of it, then it's worth doing.

Before COVID-19, Neill delighted his Twitter followers with updates on the adventures of his animals. Smoothing his white Muscovy duck, Charlie Pickering, and taking walks with his pig, Angelica. Other Twitter-famous farm animals include a calf called Graham Norton, black-faced sheep and a platoon of chooks who are named after famous actors.

"People have said that there is so much bad news that seeing a duck on *Twitter* makes them feel better. Now I feel a responsibility to provide light in a bleak world," said Neil.

"Whether or not there are people around I do find solace in company with my animals; I enjoy them. The conversation isn't all that riveting but very happy to be in each other's company."

When asked by Australian Story what he would like to be remembered for, at the time he said, "I think it behoves us more than anything to be kind. In a broad sense and in an immediate sense, just to be kind."



First Eucharist

Christ says to us at every Mass: "Here I am, poured out in love for you. Take me, I'm one with you." St Augustine in 413 wrote that the Mass was about three things: goodness, unity and charity. Augustine taught that if we were not better people working for unity and loving each other once away from the Eucharist, then, the Mass fails to achieve its purpose.

The God who comes to us at every Eucharist as real food, is the same God who asks: "When I was hungry, did you feed me?" We should link the reception of the bread of life in the Eucharist at Mass with the giving of bread away from the Mass. In other words, does the Eucharist live on through our actions towards, and treatment of, others in our daily lives?

This sacramental celebration has been postponed on a number of occasions due to this year's series of lockdowns. A Reading from the Holy Gospel according to John

'Are you the king of the Jews?' Pilate asked. Jesus replied, 'Do you ask this of your own accord, or have others spoken to you about me?' Pilate answered, 'Am I a Jew? It is your own people and the chief priests who have handed you over to me: what have you done?' Jesus replied, 'Mine is not a kingdom of this world; if my kingdom were of this world, my men would have fought to prevent my being surrendered to the Jews. But my kingdom is not of this kind.' 'So you are a king then?' said Pilate. 'It is you who say it' answered Jesus. 'Yes, I am a king. I was born for this, I came into the world for this: to bear witness to the truth; and all who are on the side of truth listen to my voice.'


give us the courage and skills to live out this challenging task.
