- Confirmation (Year 6): Sunday 28 November at 1.00pm

With Thanks to our PFA

Back in July, the PFA invited the school community to submit proposals for the allocation of PFA funds to support and enhance the education and welfare of the children at OHR. This opportunity is available once every calendar year in accordance with the rules of the PFA.

The PFA received submissions from Mrs Stephanie Axon (Science teacher) and Mrs Josephine Harrison (Digital Technologies Manager). Submissions had to be received by the closing date of 4 September.

A PFA Fundraising Expenditure Subcommittee was established to determine that the proposals met the criteria established by the PFA.

The proposals were subsequently presented to, and voted on, by members of the PFA during last week's meeting.

Of the \$13,200 of available funds for proposals, approximately \$1,200 was granted for the purchase of five dual power stereo microscopes for the Science room, with the remaining funds enabling the purchase of further Chromebooks, iPads and relevant licences.

On behalf of the school staff, I would like to thank the PFA – and all parents, for that matter – for the generous allocation of funds. The children will be the true beneficiaries of these purchases.







Formation of Classes

The teaching staff are commencing the process of developing class placements for the 2022 school year. The construction of class lists is a process that requires teaching staff to give consideration to a great variety of factors in an effort to create a social, emotional, behavioural and academic balance within any given class, as detailed in the *Rationale* of our Formation of Classes Policy:

"At OHR we believe that learning is influenced by a diverse range of factors. The professional knowledge, judgement and discretion of all teachers is critical to the placement of students. The class allocation process should follow protocols which address the balance of social, emotional and academic needs of each child."

School Closure Days

- There will be no school for the children this Melbourne Cup long weekend, inclusive of Monday 1 November and Tuesday 2 November. With the further easing of restrictions we are hopeful that families can manage to travel further from home and/or catch up with loved ones.
- The school closure day for staff professional learning, scheduled for 2 December, has been cancelled. This day has been cancelled to enable a further day of learning for our students.

A Tribute to Charles M Schulz

During Monday morning's assembly, I shared the following story with the students. The story reminds us that during our life we all face rejection or failure. However, if we focus on developing a growth mindset we have a greater chance of overcoming these setbacks and images of poor selfworth.

"This is the story of a boy named Sparky. For Sparky, school was all but impossible. He failed physics in high school, getting a mark of zero. He also failed Latin, algebra, and English. Sparky didn't do much better in sports. Although he did manage to make the school's golf team, he promptly lost the only important match of the season. The was, however, a consolation match; he lost that too.

Throughout his youth, Sparky was awkward socially. He was not actually disliked by the other students; it was just that on one cared that much. He was astonished if a classmate ever said hello to him outside school hours. There's no way to tell how he might have gone at dating a girl, as Sparky never once asked a girl to go out while he was in high school. He was too afraid of being turned down.

Sparky was considered a loser. He, his classmates ... everyone seemed to know it. Sparky made up his mind early in life that if things were meant to work out, they would.

However, one thing was important to Sparky – drawing. He was proud of his artwork. Of course, no one else appreciated it. In his senior year of high school, he submitted some cartoons to the editors of the school's yearbook. The cartoons were turned down. Despite his rejection, Sparky was so convinced of his ability that he decided to become a professional artist.

After completing high school, he wrote a letter to Walt Disney Studios. He was told to send some samples of his artwork, and a subject for a cartoon was suggested. Sparky drew the proposed cartoon. He spent a great deal of time on it and on all the other drawings he submitted.

Finally, the reply came from Disney Studios. He had been rejected once again. Another loss for the so-called loser. So Sparky decided to write his own autobiography in cartoons. He described his childhood self – a little boy loser and chronic underachiever. That cartoon character would soon become famous worldwide.

For Sparky, the boy who had such a lack of success in school and whose work was rejected again and again was, in fact, Charles Schulz. He created the "Peanuts" comic strip and the little cartoon character whose kite would never fly and who never succeeded in kicking a football – Charlie Brown."

A Reading from the Holy Gospel according to Mark

One of the scribes came up to Jesus and put a question to him, 'Which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus replied, 'This is the first: Listen, Israel, the Lord our God is the one Lord, and you must love the Lord you God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this: You must love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these.'
